Do not insert a running title on the opening page of your essay. Do not insert any page numbers).</p> <p><b>2. Line spacing: single (1)</b></p> <p><b>3. Heading (Author):</b> From top margin, leave four single-spaced blank lines. Use Times New Roman 12, bold, centered, in caps.</p> <p><b>4. Heading (Title):</b> After Author, leave two single-spaced blank lines. Use Times New Roman 12, bold, centered, in small letters.</p> <p><b>5. Text:</b> After Title, leave two single-spaced blank lines. Use Times New Roman 12, regular, indented 05 cm. on the first line (indent every new paragraph). Any chapters/paragraphs should be numbered, indented 05 cm, and followed by the title (if any) in italics. Do not use a period after the title (leave two single-spaced blank lines before and after a chapter/paragraph).</p> <p><b>6. Notes:</b> Footnotes, size 10, numbered sequentially (first line indented by 05 cm.)</p> <p><b>7. In Text:</b> extensive quotations in size 10, regular, with justified 1 cm. Use italics:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1) for titles (of works, articles, miscellaneous volumes, etc.);</li> <li>2) for Latin locutions and abbreviations (such as <i>locus classicus, scil., v.l., etc.</i>);</li> <li>3) for texts by Latin authors, classical and medieval (if not run on in reduced size in the text);</li> <li>4) for Italian and foreign, ancient and modern literary texts;</li> <li>5) for foreign words in the original language, if not commonly used (e.g. <i>Leitmotiv, Wortstellung</i>);</li> <li>6) for Latin shelf-marks of manuscripts, e.g. <i>Vat.Gr., Pal., Guelferbytanus</i>.</li> </ol> <p>III. Use bold type for sigla used to identify manuscripts (e.g. <b>A, V, b, S</b>).</p> <p>IV. <p><b>III. Punctuation</b></p>	<p>Insert between quotation marks (“ ”):</p>										

	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1) Quotations from scholarly works (Latin, English, and foreign), if not run on in the text;</li> <li>2) Translations, if not run on in the text.</li> <li>3) For quotations within quotations, use single quotation marks within double marks (“... ’...’ ...”). Within parentheses, use square brackets.</li> <li>4) Use single quotation marks (‘ ’) to indicate the meaning of words [e.g. <i>bios</i>, ‘life,’ ‘livelihood’].</li> <li>5) For works co-authored by several writers, use commas between the names of each author.</li> <li>6) The footnote number will always follow the period or other punctuation marks.</li> </ol>
<p><b>IV. Citations</b></p>	<p>APA style for books as well as articles in journals: e.g. Degani 1992, 307 [a single page] (307f. [two pages]; 307ff. [more than two pages; also 307-310]).</p> <p>The complete citation of the work will go in the Works Cited section at the end of the <b>work</b> (see section V, Abbreviations).</p> <p>For books, manuals, widely used reference works use short citations (see section <b>V Abbreviations</b>) inclusive of volume and page(s) (without vol., p. or pp.), e.g.:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>- Schwyzer-Debrunner, <i>GG</i> II 126;</li> <li>- <i>LSJ</i> 122 (or: <i>LSJ</i> 122, s.v. <i>anastrepho</i>, II.1.2);</li> <li>- <i>ThGL</i> VII 122 (cite the <i>Thesaurus</i> in the original eight-volume edition: both volumes pertaining to <i>alpha</i> will be marked I/1 and I/2);</li> <li>- <i>ThLL</i> IV 223,53 ff. II 47,2).</p> <p>For papyrological and epigraphical publications, use the same sigla as in Liddell-Scott, but insert a period after the <i>P</i> that indicates <i>Papyri</i> (e.g.: <i>P.Oxy.</i>).</p> <p>5. <p><b>VI. Bibliographical references</b></p>	<p>1. <b>Bibliographical references:</b> At the end of the article, after two single-spaced blank lines from the text, with centered heading, in caps. Repeat in alphabetical order the siglum used in text (last name and year). On a new line, justified and indented 05 cm, the full citation with name, last name, title, place of publication, year. Journals are cited in italics, with volume number in Roman numerals, year in parentheses, first and last page. For miscellaneous volumes (proceedings etc.), always indicate the editor (ed.)</p>
